A statement on Adrian Vermeule's false, violent, and discriminatory statements

Dear Deans Sells, Jefferson, Sherman, Claypoole, and Cohen,

We are writing to you because HLS Professor Adrian Vermeule has, for over a year, been making highly offensive, discriminatory, and violent statements in online posts. It has also come to our attention that Prof. Vermeule has recently been using his personal Twitter account to spread election disinformation. While we understand that Prof. Vermeule speaks only for himself, and not for the Law School, the administration should not ignore the harm his words cause. You will find examples of the statements at issue in the Appendix. We urge you to take action to address this issue with Prof. Vermeule directly and to mitigate the harm his interaction with students may cause through the measures detailed below.

First, Prof. Vermeule's tweets are contributing to the harmful spread of election disinformation. While every election will highlight substantial disagreements on a wide range of issues, Prof. Vermeule's statements cross the line of ordinary political disagreement and veer into baseless conspiracy theories which undermine the electoral process itself.

For example, as unsubstantiated allegations of widespread voter fraud spread following the election, Prof. Vermeule tweeted "Lol the election isn't over until Team Joe fixes up your ballot for you" and "Kids, not sure if you knew this, but missing ballots have magical properties that make them visible only between midnight and 6am." His post-election retweets included statements such as "Even a Saddam Hussein had to make some pretence of not getting 100% of the vote in an Iraqi election ... 'Baghdad on the Delaware.'" And these examples only scratch the surface. Prof. Vermeule may try to play off his statements as a joke, but they amount to a pattern of promoting demonstrably false conspiracy theories. His statements are harmful to democracy and unbelievably divisive. To work at Harvard Law School is to be granted a platform and a level of legitimacy. Prof. Vermeule is abusing this platform in order to undermine democracy and delegitimize the results of the election.

But it does not end here. Prof. Vermeule has repeatedly propagated violent and offensive language on his Twitter account. In one tweet, referring to an event titled "Summit on Principled Conservatism," Vermeule wrote "The very first group for the camps." Any invocation of concentration or internment camps is despicable and unacceptable—and above all, it is not a joke. Many HLS students are descedents of Holocaust survivors, victims of genocide or of internment, or enslaved people; some may even have relatives currently in these sorts of camps. In response to a tweet that read "...visitors to Spain in the 1950 and 1960s found ex-Spanish Civil War communists/socialists working on chain gangs, building roads, cleaning public places, etc. General Franco did not shoot them, instead wanting them to 'redeem themselves by work...'" Prof. Vermeule wrote: "The Good Society ..." This language is not

normal and it cannot be normalized. It is a language that promotes violence on the basis of political opinion and it cannot be tolerated. Prof. Vermeule demonstrates a disdain for opposing viewpoints, such as those of communists and socialists, who *are* equal members of our society.

This is not about 'academic freedom.' Professor Vermuele has repeatedly glorified and called for violence against those with different political viewpoints. For example, amidst the ongoing anti-police brutality protests around the country, he retweeted: "The best defence against evil men are good men who are skilled at violence." Prof. Vermeule also advocated for the forcible removal of Black Lives Matter protesters in Portland, tweeting "Time for a whiff of grapeshot," In response, someone asked Prof. Vermeule "Why are there no high pressure hoses?" to which Vermeule responded "Good question." Prof. Vermeule's tweets display an unacceptable pattern of supporting violence against Black protesters.

Professor Vermeule has also made statements indicating an intolerance that runs counter to HLS's Policy on Discrimination. Prof. Vermeule has suggested that the United States should give immigration priority to confirmed Catholics over members of other religious groups. Prof. Vermeule said that state laws barring atheists from holding public office or serving on juries were "sensible" because "atheists can't be trusted to keep an oath." Prof. Vermeule has demonized abortion, same-sex marriage, and transgender people, comparing them to "polygamy, consensual adult incest, or who knows what." Most recently, Prof. Vermeule was interviewed for an article where he criticized "liberalisation of abortion, same sex marriage becoming the law of the land and allowing sexualised drag queens near young children." Prof. Vermeule uses transphobic and pathologizing language like "transgenderism." His language treats LGBT identity as inherently sexual, deviant, and predatory.

Prof. Vermeule is, of course, free to have his own political opinions. However, his statements raise questions about whether he will treat all students fairly and undermine the ability to learn in his classroom. How can we trust that the content of Prof. Vermeule's classes is accurate, if he peddles baseless conspiracy theories? How can Muslim, Jewish, atheist, and LGBTQ students in Professor Vermeule's classes trust that he will treat them fairly when his public statements demonstrate that he views their identities with contempt? How can Black students effectively learn in Prof. Vermeule's class when he calls for Black Lives Matter protesters to be shot with high-pressure water hoses? As students, we need to know that our professors will not think less of us, grade us more harshly, or treat us differently on the basis of our identities. Even if Prof. Vermeule does not bring these opinions into class, the public nature of these statements mean that they will inevitably impact students' ability to learn or trust what he says. Students are less likely to feel comfortable going to office hours, discussing class topics, or engaging with Prof. Vermeule at all, as they justifiably believe he has disdain for them. This is not a question of academic freedom; it is an issue of potential discrimination and of student dignity. We must be able to exist in a classroom without feeling trauma if we are to effectively learn, and Harvard

¹ **Grapeshot** was a form of ammunition from a cannon in Napoleonic times, and it is a quote from Napoleon describing how he dispersed crowds with cannon fire. He fired **grapeshot** into the crowd, and so a "whiff of grapeshot" refers to that incident.

must ensure that its professors are not discriminating against their own students on the basis of religion, race, political opinion, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

These dynamics are particularly harmful considering Prof. Vermeule's status as one of the few professors who teaches Administrative Law. In both the 2019-20 and 2020-21 academic years, HLS offered only **two** sections of Admin Law. Each year, one of those two sections was with Prof. Vermeule. Admin Law is one of law school's foundational courses. It is not uncommon for the waitlist for a given Admin Law class to exceed 300 people. For many students hoping to clerk, to work for the federal government, or to practice administrative law, the course is more of a requirement than an elective. Many HLS students who need to take administrative law will not be able to avoid taking a class with Professor Vermeule. Additionally, Prof. Vermeule has taught Legislation and Regulation in the past, such that many 1Ls have been forced to take classes with him. Finally, Prof. Vermeule's statements undermine HLS's ability to attract a diverse student body, if prospective students learn that HLS is the kind of place where prominent professors can spout highly offensive rhetoric without consequence.

We ask that Harvard Law School take the following steps:

- Release a statement condemning Prof. Vermeule's spread of inaccurate conspiracy theories about the election, violent rhetoric, and intolerant statements. (Stanford University <u>recently came out against</u> a professor in a similar fashion, so it would not be unprecedented for HLS to do the same.)
- Conduct an investigation into whether Prof. Vermeule is spreading misinformation or discriminatory content in his classes and/or discriminating against students on the basis of characteristics protected by HLS's Policy Against Discrimination, and take appropriate action until the investigation is completed.
- 3. Create at least two sections of Administrative Law per semester, so that no student is forced to take a class with Prof. Vermeule.
- 4. Commit that going forward, 1Ls will not be required to take a class with Prof. Vermeule.





I want to suggest a principle of immigration priority that should, I hope, be broadly acceptable or at least intriguing for all right-thinking persons concerned that current American immigration policy is racist and classist, explicitly or implicitly, de jure or de facto. The principle is to give lexical priority to confirmed Catholics, all of whom will jump immediately to the head of the queue. Yes, some will convert in order to gain admission; this is a feature, not a bug.

This principle will disproportionately favor immigrants from Africa, Asia, and Latin America. (Note here that the priority is for actual Catholics, not for applicants from "historically Catholic countries"; relatively few Western Europeans will pass through the eye of the needle, and the Irish will be almost totally excluded). It will disproportionately favor the poor, and will draw no distinction between those seeking asylum based on a fear of persecution, and those fleeing "mere" economic hardship. It will in effect require opening the southern border of the United States, although immigration from Canada will rightly become a rare and difficult event, at least if we do not count a small subset of Quebecois.

I venture to say that any opposition to this proposal almost necessarily defends some alternative principle of immigration priority that allocates fewer spots to non-whites and to the poor, and is thus a troubling indicator of racism and classism infesting whoever voices that opposition. We must overcome the know-nothing bigotry of the past. As the superb blog Semiduplex observes, Catholics need to rethink the nation-state. We have come a long way, but we still have far to go — towards the eventual formation of the Empire of Our Lady of Guadalupe, and ultimately the world government required by natural law.



The first, more straightforward claim is that liberalism is destined to fail because it follows a deterministic process of decline. This is the view expounded in Vermeule's 2018 essay "Integration from Within," that "the progression...from one form of liberalism to another unfolds by logical dynamic, an inner necessity." Vermeule often presents liberalism as being propelled by an "internal mechanism" of "relentless aggression," a kind of moral avant-gardism that can never be satisfied, let alone reversed. For liberalism, he argues, "yesterday the frontier was divorce, contraception, and abortion; then it became same-sex marriage; today it is transgenderism; tomorrow it may be polygamy, consensual adult incest, or who knows what." He chastises conservatives like Ross Douthat for failing to acknowledge that liberal regimes always move in this direction.




